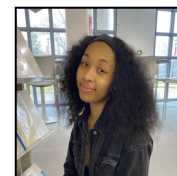
Introducing Our Library Student Workers

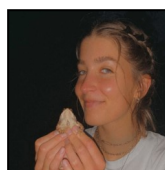

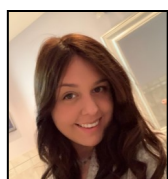
Elena Cavijo is a junior human society major with a minor in psychology. She is from South River, New Jersey.

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Swedenborgiana Updates

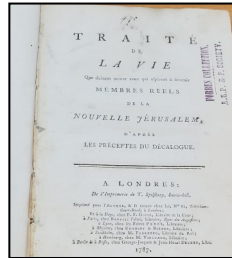
On February 4th we received the second and last donation of 75 rare New Church books from the Forbes Collection at the Swedenborg Foundation.



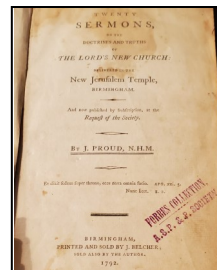

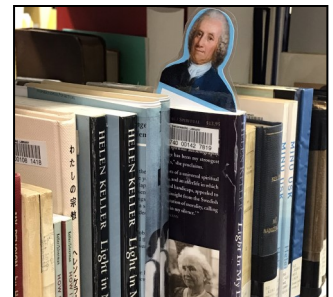

Celebrating Emanuel Swedenborg's Birthday!!

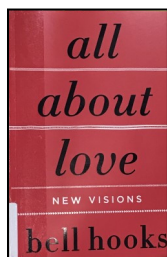

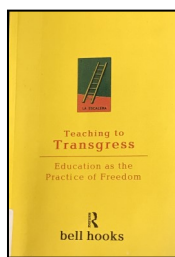

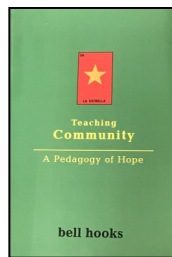
Reading bell hooks



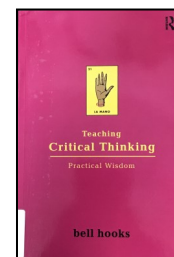
All About Love: New Visions. 2001. If you haven't read bell hooks before, this is the place to begin. Here, she gives us a graceful, engaging and encouraging look at the deep meanings of love. She starts by teasing out a definition of love and then shows us an ethical, community-based, spiritual application for life. Referencing the Bible and well-respected theologians, philosophers, and thinkers, including Thomas Merton, Thich Naht Hahn, Julian of Norwich, and Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr., she grounds her insights in positive practicalities. Highly recommended for all.

Teaching to Transgress: Education as the Practice of Freedom. 1994. In this collection of essays, bell hooks considers her own development in teaching with a transformative pedagogy committed to creating educational communities. She acknowledges that allowing ourselves and our students to explore shifting paradigms causes challenge and discomfort which require new skills and compassion for ourselves and each other. She passionately believes in "education as the practice of freedom" and maps the way forward.

Teaching Community: A Pedagogy of Hope. 2003. Writing a few years after 9/11 and the dramatic impact that tragedy had on our country, our mass media and our culture, hooks recalls the core resonance of hope built into education for freedom and community. She addresses the challenges of racism and white supremacy. Guided by Parker Palmer and Paulo Freire, she found wisdom and joy in exploring ways democratic education can illuminate our theory and practice, and create stronger, freer community based on shared ethical values.

Teaching Critical Thinking: Practical Wisdom. 2013. This is the third volume in the series on teaching. Looking back over the last thirty years, hooks is able to respond to many questions and comments from professors and teachers who have studied and practiced her educational techniques. She addresses issues of race, gender, class and pedagogy with insight, humor and grace. Teaching with humor, story-telling, and lecture blend with imagination, collaboration, wisdom and spirituality. Of course she also praises a love of reading!
