

# Updating Our Online Catalog

### Experience to Serve Students and Faculty Better

We are happy to announce our online catalog display has been recently updated! Along with improved search functions, we have customized many parts of the *SirsiDynix Enterprise* interface and revamped and modernized the look and colors. This is a powerful web-based tool is ready for all devices -- computer, tablet, or phone. *Enterprise* allows you to intuitively search the library's catalog as well as other resources and is user-friendly and accessible.



#### Improvements:

- Added a library logo to identify ourselves and changed the color scheme to modernize the look.
- Combined the 'physical items' catalog with E-resources for easy access to both collections.
- Links to popular E-resources for academic research are displayed prominently.
- Included a link to our new feature CloudSource OA, an expanding, scholarly, peer-reviewed, open access (OA) content collection, which is free of cost to users.
- A link to our *Interlibrary Loan* service is available on every page.
- The "Let's Chat" feature pops up automatically, so you can ask questions or seek help directly from one of our staff.
- The default search targets the Main Library to see locally available items.
- Peer-reviewed and scholarly journal articles can be searched in the catalog.
- Project Gutenberg allows electronic access to thousands of classics in the public domain.
- From the *My Account* area at the top of the page, patrons can view their checkouts and edit their personal information.
- Patrons can narrow their search results using a variety of filters—no advanced search techniques necessary.
- ADA compliant

Meanwhile, used book sales continue on a limited, by request basis.


The Friends of the Swedenborg Library has been vital to library operations.


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### New Non-Fiction Books in the Library



How to Do Nothing by Jenny Odell. This book is about how to reclaim our time, attention, and enjoyment of life through connection to the people and places we inhabit in real time. Odell says, "I propose that rerouting and upending one's attention to place will likely lead to awareness of one's participation in history and in a more-than-human community. From either a social or ecological perspective, the ultimate goal of 'doing nothing' is to wrest our focus from the attention economy and replant it in the public,

physical realm." The author covers the development of her thoughts on reclaiming attention and grounding in our places in four phases: the need to "do nothing" at times, the usefulness of retreats, how to refuse to lose control of one's attention, and how to use art to think about the relationship between attention and volition. Equity by Design by Mirko Chardin and Katie Novak. This book comes highly

recommended by Dr. Kelly Ballard, head the Masters in Special Education Program. It is based on Universal Design for Learning, which is a science-based framework for guiding educators in creating flexible, accessible, and challenging curriculum for all types of learners. Connecting UDL practice with a desire to promote student learning makes this volume particularly important. Dr. Berry and Dr. Gross highlight twelve women in a wide spectrum of occupations and spheres of influence who contributed to the spiritual, civic, economic, social, political, and educational development of our county over the past 400 years. It is written in an accessible narrative style that draws readers in to listen to fascinating stories of courage, creativity and heroism.
