> Once you have registered, you will be able to access your personal ILLiad page. You can use the links to complete and submit new requests, or check the status of all the requests you have made. You can also edit or cancel requests. Articles can be retrieved as PDF files, and you can check due dates or make renewal requests on

books you have received. You can even update your personal information yourself.

We are also introducing some new policies for interlibrary loan. These policies will appear online during the registration process. It is very important that you review these policies. You will be able to read the policies in detail on the ILLiad website, but here are two important points to remember:

- You cannot use ILL services if you owe any overdue fines, either for ILL items or those owned by this library.
- · Repeated problems with lateness or mistreatment of ILL items may result in loss of ILL privileges.

Interlibrary loan is a privilege. Our ability to obtain ILL items depends on maintaining good relations with other libraries.

Notes from the Archives: Part 2

In the last article (see BI-Lines, Winter 2008), I defined what an archive is. Over the next several issues, I'll talk about what an archive does. The topic for this issue is Selection and Appraisal.

Appraisal is process of determining whether material fits with the mission of the archives, whether it is unique, and whether it is in useable condition.

First: mission. In many cases, there is a fine line between what is community or church history and what is family history. For example, if a community member with a long history of affiliation with the Church or community offers us his or her papers, it is very likely that those papers are relevant to our mission. However, if they detailed the family history of a brother-in-law who had no real New Church connection, but was a famous inventor, we would be likely to decline

them. As interesting as those papers might be, they don't fit the mission of *our* archive. However, we are always willing to offer collections to archives or historical societies where the items would be more useful and relevant.

We must also be mindful of the physical condition of a collection. If the collection required extensive conservation work before it could be made available, we would likely have to decline the donation, unless it came with funds for conservation.

Many documents are made of materials that not only disintegrate quickly, but harm the materials around them as well. For example, old film and negatives made from a nitrate base are considered so destructive they are covered in the National Fire Protection Association standard. Professional film labs can conserve the film and transfer it to a useable format such as magnetic tape or DVD, but the

process is very expensive. The original film is kept as backup. Items with insect infestations and acidic materials such as newspaper also cause problems for archivists.

Once materials have been appraised and selected, they must be arranged and described in a way that makes them useable to researchers.

Swedenborg Library Mission Statement

The primary purpose of the Swedenborg Library is the acquisition, preservation and promotion of the New Church collections and archives for use throughout the world. These collections include books written by Swedenborg (first editions, subsequent editions and translations), copies of books known to have been owned by Swedenborg, and books and periodicals of the 17th and 18th centuries (particularly in the sciences and religion) either used by Swedenborg or reflecting the thought of his age. A collection of collateral literature covers all aspects of study of Swedenborg and the New Church. The archives are a cultural resource containing a variety of documents, letters and photographs relevant to the New Church, the Academy, and the Bryn Athyn community. The next most important use is to provide materials and information, in various forms, in support of the academic programs of the Academy schools. The library also serves as a resource for members of the local community.
