It's illustrated and written in a readable way, using humor and enthusiasm to demonstrate scientific findings." Marvin Clymer, Digital Collections Cataloger, makes this timely reading suggestion: "Having just past the 10 year anniversary of the War in Iraq and with the War in Afghanistan winding down, it seems fitting to look back at why we went to war, what we have gained, and what we have lost as a result of these conflicts. Losing Alicia: A Father's Journey After 9/11 by John L. Titus is very appropriate to this discussion. Alicia was a flight attendant on the plane that crashed into the South Tower of the World Trade Center on September 11, 2001. Despite the intense pain and grief that his family has experienced, Mr. Titus (a Swedenborgian) has not called for vengeance. He encourages readers to respond to hatred with tolerance and to help the world move away from the endless cycle of retaliation and war.

## Director's web site tip: Copyright Alert System

This month, the Center for Copyright Information (CCI) launched a "Copyright Alert System" based on IP addresses that checks if a file is being shared illegally. This service protects the owners of the content of movies, music and television shows, the artists, moviemakers and others. Copyright law protects this content whether in CD, DVD, or as a digital file on the Internet.

How does this service work?

If the service notices a file being shared illegally, they will notify the Internet Service Provider (ISP) and the ISP then passes on that notice to their subscriber. The first two alerts received by a subscriber will educate the consumer and provide information about ways to access digital content legally. If the copyright infringement continues, the service provider (ISP) can then temporarily limit the subscriber's services. If the illegal file sharing continues, the final phase is litigation.
